JULY MAKE A CHANGE: Shalom Children's Hope and Shalom Children's Home

As other parishioners have done over the years, Emily Venter is planning to adopt a child from a developing country. In this case, it is Ethiopia. Ethiopia is located in the Horn of Africa and is the second most populated country in Africa. It is the birthplace of coffee and is often called the cradle of humanity because the oldest known human fossils were found there. It is the second oldest country to have officially become Christian and they claim to be the homeland of the Queen of Sheba, as well as her son by King Solomon and one of the Wiseman. In addition, they claim to have the Ark of the Covenant in a church Aksum. It is a country full of proud people devoted to faith and family.

But it is a country it desperate need of help. Ethiopia has been plagued by years of war and famine and it has taken a great toll on the country and its people. Ethiopia is the 8th poorest country in the world with more than 80% of its population living on less than \$2 a day. 78% of its people do not have access to clean water and almost 30% do not have adequate sanitation. The median age in Ethiopia is 18, more than 33% of it population will not live to see the age of 40, 1 in 8 children will die before the age of 5, 1 in 10 before they reach their first birthday, many from malnourishment and common diseases. UNICEF estimates

that there are more than 5 million orphaned children in Ethiopia. (To give you a U.S. equivalent, that is about the same number of total children in Ohio, Kentucky, and Indiana combined.) Periodic droughts, food insecurity, war, lack of healthcare and education, high birthrates and AIDS are all among the many causes for this shockingly high number. The lucky children are taken in by extended family, others end up in orphanages and some are on the street.

Emily is working with an agency that supports two children's homes in Ethiopia called Shalom Children's Hope and Shalom Children's Home. The centers offer preservation services to families in need, including education on nutrition and childcare, assistance in finding work, counseling, temporary childcare, as well as care for children who have been orphaned or relinquished due to family circumstances. Because of the great need, they are asking for assistance from humanitarian aid to provide the basics such as soap, formula, food, clothing, medicine and diapers.
