PASTOR'S CORNER

Unless you emerged recently from a Rip Van Winkle sleep, you are aware that there is a "super committee" in Washington charged with cobbling together an agreement regarding the federal government's financial crisis. You are undoubtedly aware that this is serious business. The decision, or lack of one, has potentially far-reaching consequences for all of us. The most recent issue of *The Catholic Telegraph*, which should be reaching all households registered in the Parish, has an article (p.11) entitled "American Dream becoming unreachable for a larger segment of the country". This committee's work will have an impact on that.

In such a situation the Catholic Bishops have a responsibility to bring the light of Catholic moral tradition to the debate. (Remember, the digital edition of this bulletin features "active" links) Bottom line is that they have gathered with other leaders across the religious spectrum to

call for a "circle of protection" around the essential needs of hungry and poor people at home and abroad.

Kathy Saile, a representative of the Bishops Conference, will be offering an enlightening look into the whys and wherefore's of the Conference. On Wednesday, Oct. 19 she will be at St. Mary's Parish in Hyde Park (Cincinnati) and on Thursday, Oct. 20 at the Archbishop Pilarczyk Center 1436 Needmore Rd., Dayton); both from 7:00 pm to 9:00 pm.

With so many loud voices out there, I encourage you to find out what our Catholic Bishops are saying about the light our two thousand year-old tradition can bring to this modern problem.

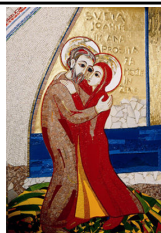
PRAYER PARTNERS
